This is Detective Sergeant Brad Flynn with the - ah - Helena Alabama

25 FLYNN: Okay. And can you also please confirm that you are the same person that

provided the ah - typed statement to the Queensland Police Service on

I can confirm that - yes

FLYNN: Alright. And I'm going to - ah - also - have a copy here of your statement - and - (indistinct) I would like bring you to - ah - please sign

35	STUTZ:	Do you want me to re-read it all
	FLYNN:	No. No – it's not necessary – as long as you can confirm that – you can just ah
40	STUTZ:	That's my statement
	FLYNN:	Alright. You can sign and date it please - there on the top
45	STUTZ:	Ah – each page
	FLYNN:	Ah - just ah - let's see - um - each page - yes - please.
50	STUTZ:	(Indistinct) sign it all
55	FLYNN:	(Indistinct) there. Alright. And I want you to sign these as well. Alright. And – ah - one additional thing - I'd like for you to – also look at these copies of this – um – these emails that you and Detective Sergeant Gary Campbell of Queensland Police Service – ah – exchanged on Saturday the Thirtieth of October 2004 – if you could – confirm that
	STUTZ:	Sure. (Indistinct)
60	FLYNN:	Alright - if you could sign and date them as well
00	STUTZ:	Sure
	FLYNN:	Alright. Here's one additional copy of the statement that we didn't sign
65	STUTZ:	Sure
70 75	FLYNN:	That's just the last page of your statement. Alright. Alright. That's -um - what we're gonna do - is I'm going to - basically we're gonna go over - ah - your ah - go over the emails - that ah - that you and Detective Sergeant Campbell exchanged - and just to clarify some of your answers as well as - ah - um - if you had anything new that you might - could ah - interject - that'll be - that'll be great too. Um - let's see - ah - just to confirm that you were on the - ah - vessel - the JAZZ 2 - on the date of her death which was October Twenty-Second 2003 - is that correct
	STUTZ:	That's correct

80	FLYNN:	Okay. And - basically give me a little background on the JAZZ 2 as far as the $ah - ah - whatever$ your $ah - your$ plans were for that day
85	STUTZ:	Um-my plans were $-ah-I$ was with a group of $-ah-divers$ who were all getting our Advanced Open Water PADI Certificate $-$ and our plans were to $-ah-dive$ the Yongala and $-ah-that$ was for deep dive in the last part of our $-ah-um-certification$ . Um. Our plans were to $-dive$ the wreck and get certified
90	FLYNN:	Okay. Um – and we're going to clarify that - um – the persons – ah – we're gonna go ahead onto the interview – or go into the reviewing of the - ah – the emails – um – did Detective – Detective Campbell ask you to clarify the person that you refer to as Diver 1 in your statement – ah – that you gave to the - ah - Queensland Police Service – ah – any comment if - ah – the person you identified as Diver 1 - in that statement
95		is the same - ah - diver that you refer to in Paragraph 29 of your statement - that the female diver with the blonde-brownish hair - or are you unable to say
	STUTZ:	Ah - I can clarify that was the same diver - okay
100	FLYNN:	Alright. Um – in Paragraph 12 – ah – of your statement – you appear to indicate that Diver 1 and 2 – were part of a larger group – ah – this is prior to their separation – with the result – of one ascending and one descending. How many - were in this group in total – across how much of an area was this group spread – are we talking a tight bunch that can touch each other – or individual persons separated by several metres
	STUTZ:	Um. Ah – well I saw probably about four or five - people together. Immediately when I saw them – I assumed they were all in a group. They looked to be in a group
110	FLYNN:	Okay
115	STUTZ:	Um – they were spread out – ah – not by metres – ah – probably – phew – I would say probably about five or ten feet apart – not close enough – ah – that they were touching.
	FLYNN:	Okay
120	STUTZ:	Um – close enough- so that they were together as a group but they could still swim freely
	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright – um – the next question – ah - when Diver 1 and 2 were together – how far away was the next closest diver that you can recall. Were they below or above the group - or tell you what – let's go ahead
125		and ah - there's several questions in this

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	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
130	FLYNN:	You tell me how Diver 1 and 2 were together - how far away was the next closest diver
	STUTZ:	I can't still recall
135	FLYNN:	Okay. You put in your statement $-$ ah $-$ and your answer $-$ the closest diver was approximately ten feet away $-$ would that be
	STUTZ:	Yes - that was prob
140	FLYNN:	That was approximate – yep – okay. Alright. Um. Were Diver 1 and 2 – were they above or below this group – or – can you recall
	STUTZ:	Ah – as I recall Diver 1 and 2 were - in the group
145	FLYNN:	Uh-huh
115	STUTZ:	Um - and ah - um - yeah - they were in the middle of the group
150	FLYNN:	They weren't above or below. I mean there were some divers who were above them
120	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
	STUTZ:	Clearly - ah - but - ah - I think there were divers from below them too
155	FLYNN:	Alright. Ah – would it be possible that the rest of this group were not conscious of the two divers and that the group was ahead or above them or would it be possible that the rest of the group - not being conscious of one cradling the other – or when they separated
160	STUTZ:	Yes, I think that's possible
	FLYNN:	Ah - you think it's possible they were not aware $-$ not conscious $-$ aware of their presence
165	STUTZ:	Yeah - correct
	FLYNN:	Alright. In Paragraph
170	STUTZ:	I don't know $-$ I $-$ they $-$ they may have known $-$ known that we were there $-$ but I $-$ I don't necessarily $-$ I think it's possible that they didn't know that there was a distressed diver

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175	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. In Paragraph 13 of your statement you refer to Diver 2 cradling Diver 1
	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
180	FLYNN:	I'm trying to – to establish if this pair of divers are one and the same as the deceased and her husband. Can you comment on the heights and builds of those two divers in relation to each other
185	STUTZ:	Ah – Diver 2 – ah – I don't know if it was her husband but ah – that diver – ah – was bigger than Diver 1 – ah – struck me as a male – um – and – that's about all I can say. Um - so
102	FLYNN:	The Diver 1 - you - there's no doubt in your mind that was the deceased
	STUTZ:	Definitely
190	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. Alright – when Diver 1 was being cradled by Diver 2 – can you be more specific about how Diver 2 was holding onto Diver 1
195	STUTZ:	Sure. I saw Diver $2 - um - come$ into the picture $-ah$ - initially after I saw Diver $1 - on - basically on her back looking up - ah - at - I would imagine her view was a line of us going down$
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
200	STUTZ:	So she could probably look up and see us along a line
200	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
205	STUTZ:	Um-ah-we did eye contact and I could see she was in distress – and I saw him come into the picture. Ah – he was probably initially – I don't know – maybe ten feet away from her
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
210	STUTZ:	Ah – but the same depth in the water – ah - he came – to her – ah – and came sort of on top of her – ah – put his arms around her
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
215	STUTZ:	Ah – and they were together – $ah$ – for $ah$ – probably what seemed like maybe thirty seconds
	FLYNN:	Mm-hinm

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220	STUTZ:	Hard to judge exactly. Um – and then – ah – they split apart. He - went to the surface – relatively quickly
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
225	STUTZ:	Ah $-$ and $-$ ah $-$ she $-$ um $-$ basically was not neutrally buoyant $-$ and sunk to the bottom $-$ and $-$ I lost eye contact with her and I $-$ couldn't $-$ couldn't see where she actually went $-$ into the dark
230	FLYNN:	It's okay. Did uh – when you say that he came up and - ah – was on top of her – was he facing her or was he around behind her
230	STUTZ:	He was facing her
235	FLYNN:	He was facing her. Okay. Ah – and at anytime could you tell where his hand placement was – when he was facing her or on top of her
233	STUTZ:	I recall his hands being around her back
	FLYNN:	Around her back
240	STUTZ:	Both of his hands being around her back
	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. But at no time - did you ever see him - behind her - at any time
245	STUTZ:	Never
	FLYNN:	Okay - so he was - just to clarify - she was on her back - looking up
250	STUTZ:	Looking up – yep
	FLYNN:	You know – kinda floating.
	STUTZ:	She was - that was the surface of the water
255	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	She would have been on her back with her arms held like this (indistinct) and moving her arms like she was in distress
260	FLYNN:	Uh-huh
	STUTZ:	With a look of fear on her face — and moving her legs in a similar manner — um and then he came — he swam over to her — came on top of her — um — and was face to face with her
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	STUTZ:	I know as she was floating to the bottom I can mimic it
310	FLYNN:	Okay
305	STUTZ:	No – it was – what init – initially caught my eye was that I could tell that she was in distress of some kind because she wasn't moving normally – she wasn't like thrashing – she was – um –not thrashing in the sense that she was like very strong and actively moving – she looked - in distress – and fearful – and moving her arms and legs. He came – on top of her – ah – after they split – and – and went in their different directions - she was still moving – but sort of – ah was moving less and less
300	FLYNN:	After there was contact – okay. Was it – ah – like thrashing or was it just
	STUTZ:	After there was contact
درد	FLYNN:	Okay – was this before or after – there was contact with her
295	STUTZ:	Yes
290	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. Um – as far as us – um – our communication – you mentioned that you saw her – ah – ah – when she was – ah – floating towards the bottom – was she still moving
	STUTZ:	No. I don't. I just remember them wearing black dive suits
285	FLYNN:	Okay. Ah – do you recall the type of mask Diver 1 had or anything in particular about the diving rig of either diver
	STUTZ:	Don't recall
280	FLYNN:	Don't recall. Okay. Ah – do you recall if there were any bubbles – ah – coming up from her when you saw her descending towards the bottom
	STUTZ:	I don't recall
275	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. Could you tell if there were any – or do you recall if there were any oxygen bubbles coming from Diver 1
	STUTZ:	Um – and then – he cradled her – put both hands around her – ah – and they were together for a short period of time – and split apart
270	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	At no time was he behind her
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm

315	FLYNN:	Yeah
	STUTZ:	It went something basically like this – and her leg was doing basically the same thing
320	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. It's good enough. Ah — can you give an approximate timeframe - from when Diver 1 and 2 separated and the third diver came along and picked up Diver $1$
325	STUTZ:	Ah – well I think they were together – relatively – ah – transiently – and there was probably thirty seconds. Ah – and then – like I said Diver 1 went to the surface relatively quickly and Diver $2$ – still fairly quickly but somewhat slower than him going up – fell into the depths
	FLYNN:	Okay
330	STUTZ:	Um. It struck me as - less than a minute - probably more like thirty seconds - but it seemed very quickly that another diver - ah - dove down
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
335	STUTZ:	Ah – that other diver – $ah$ – basically dove stroat – dove straight to the bottom
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
340	STUTZ:	Ah but yeah
345	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. Um. Was the group you were refer to earlier that they were a part of $-$ or somewhat separated from $-$ still around when the possible third diver picked up Diver 1
343	STUTZ:	Ah - did you mean were they still in the water
	FLYNN:	Yeah
350	STUTZ:	I don't remember seeing any other diver. I remember basically I'm so focused on those two
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
355	STUTZ:	Ah – but I don't remember seeing - I mean there certainly weren't any other divers involved – in – when Diver 1 and Diver 2 were together – there was no other diver – divers involved. Ah - when the split apart – they were no other divers that came into the picture – and when that –

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360		when that other diver went down to rescue her $-$ ah $-$ he was the only diver that was involved at that point too
365	FLYNN:	Alright $-$ do you $-$ ah $-$ do you recall which diver access point you descended on $-$ I have a $-$ ah $-$ a copy $-$ of the $-$ ah $-$ access points $-$ right there. Can you recall which one $-$ where you came in
303	STUTZ:	I believe it was this one. I can't say that with a 100% certainty but I do believe this is the one
370	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. If you could - $ah - just sign that right there - and date that$
	STUTZ:	Sure
275	FLYNN:	You're not 100% certain but that's where you think it might have been
375	STUTZ:	I - $I$ do - $I$ - $I$ - my recall - my recollection is that - $I$ mean looking at this - what $I$ do remember is that diver access point where we went in on
200	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
380	STUTZ:	Ah - I recall that end of the ship being higher than the other
	FLYNN:	Okay
385	STUTZ:	And that's what it looks like to me here
	FLYNN:	Okay
200	STUTZ:	And then – yeah – okay – so -
390	FLYNN:	Uh-huh
	STUTZ:	(Indistinct)
395	FLYNN:	Right. That's good enough. Alright. Alright – um – before Diver 1 and 2 separate – ah – can you comment on whether Diver 1 or 2 had any problems with their masks – regulators – or appeared to have been grabbing or grappling each other's masks or regulators
400	STUTZ:	Ah – I never saw any grabbing of the masks
	FLYNN:	At no time - did you - ever see Diver - $ah - 1$ - which was on the bottom facing up - grabbing at the - at Diver 2's equipment
405	STUTZ:	No. No way

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	FLYNN:	Alright. Alright in Paragraph 16
410	STUTZ:	I'm sorry, Diver I was - from my perspective she was becoming progressively weaker
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
415	STUTZ:	Um-throughout-throughout that period of time and so $-I$ don't know if she would have had the strength to do that anyways $-um-that$ 's just my perspective
420	FLYNN:	Alright. In Paragraph 16 you refer to the other diver ascending with Diver 1 – how far away from you – were – when he (indistinct)
420	STUTZ:	At the closest - it may have been - fifteen or twenty feet
	FLYNN:	Okay
425	STUTZ:	That's feet
	FLYNN:	Okay. Yep.
420	STUTZ:	And it's definitely feet not inch
430 435	FLYNN:	Okay. In Paragraph 12 you refer to distance of twenty feet in the second (indistinct) — are you sure in Paragraph 12 — and we'll go clarify that. You say it was — you're just past the five metre mark - "and I saw a bunch of divers coming up towards the surface. About twenty feet away from me in this group of divers I also saw a diver in front of another diver"
	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
440	FLYNN:	"I will refer to them as Diver 1 and Diver 2 but they were not from the JAZZ 2"
	STUTZ:	Yep
445	FLYNN:	So if you're - ah - confident that was twenty feet
450	STUTZ:	Yeah – and I'm confident it was the five metre mark – and that I – I am – I would suspect the reason I chose those terms – 'cause you know - I'm American – sure I - I naturally speak in feet when I'm thinking about distance – and I probably chose five metres because we were diving in Australia and the five metre mark was – how we were taught in dive terms – does that make any sense

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455	FLYNN:	Yes - it makes perfect sense
	STUTZ:	Alright – but yeah – it was twenty feet
460	FLYNN:	Did you see any other pair of divers that day that may have separated or did you see any situation where one diver was towing the other by holding on to their hands or vest
	STUTZ:	Well again - I saw when - the - the rescue diver - went to get her
465	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
405	STUTZ:	Not 1 or 2 but that - that third diver
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
470	STUTZ:	When he went to get her and he was towing – he had his arms around her – he was towing her up – that was the only
475	FLYNN:	At any time did you see Diver – ah - 2 – with Diver 1 – ah – holding on to her hand or towing – or attempting to tow her
4/3	STUTZ:	No
400	FLYNN:	Okay. Have you had any other information from any source $-ah-that$ may help in this investigation
480	STUTZ:	Ah – the only other thing – ah - that – ah – that I know of the situation and $I-um-wasn't$ at the time – was that I had – after the resuscitation I had spoken to – the ER doctor from Chicago
485	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
	STUTZ:	And he said that he thought that before the dive – um – 'cause I asked him – what he thought happened – and he – you know – he said that – she - he was in her group and he thought that she seemed – ah – out of
490		sorts and nervous and didn't want to dive that day - that's what he thought
495	FLYNN:	Okay. And that was the ER doctor from Chicago – the one that was attempting resuscitation prior to you surfacing
	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. I'm going to go on to another – few more series of questions in reference to ah – your statements. Um – can you confirm -

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500		which safety line – um – that you descended on – the one at the bow of the Yongala wreck or the one of which the JAZZ 2 was moored – and again we'll refer to the copy
505	STUTZ:	It was the one on the bow
202	FLYNN:	On the bow
	STUTZ:	Yep. Correct
510	FLYNN:	Alright – and just for the record – we'll show the mooring and that the JAZZ 2 was moored on – ah - Mooring Number Nine Zero Four – so – we'll say – this is the – obviously the stern – and there's the bow. This is the JAZZ 2
515	STUTZ:	Yep
	FLYNN:	And this is where you descended
500	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm. That's correct
520	FLYNN:	Alright. If you could just sign that
	STUTZ:	(Indistinct)
525	FLYNN:	Yeah
	STUTZ:	If I could – if I could just – you know that little map that I was looking at
530	FLYNN:	Yes
330	STUTZ:	This actually helps me a little bit here
	FLYNN:	Okay
535	STUTZ:	And – whi – this is – which one is the bow – line
	FLYNN:	Right here
540	STUTZ:	Ah – this one here
	FLYNN:	Yes
545	STUTZ:	Yeah – this – this is where I remember – 'cause I remember getting out – we were moored here – and I – and we had to swim over – to the descent line – which was at the bow

	FLYNN:	Okay
550	STUTZ:	So yeah - that's
	FLYNN:	Alright
	STUTZ:	And I just don't know if that's – but it's then clear – looking at this picture – I don't know if I mis-labelled the other one (indistinct)
555	FLYNN:	Yeah. Yeah. That's fine. (Indistinct) can you just expressly show on there that that's where you descended
560	STUTZ:	Do you want me – just circle the (indistinct) line
560	FLYNN:	Yeah
	STUTZ:	(Indistinct)
565	FLYNN:	(Indistinct)
	STUTZ:	This is - right - okay. This is where the ship was - right here
570	FLYNN:	This is where you went – this is where you descended
370	STUTZ:	This is where we descended - okay - this is where the ship was
	FLYNN:	Alright
575	STUTZ:	Ah – you going to write on there
	FLYNN:	Yeah – that's fine
580	STUTZ:	And this is – ah – ship mark
360	FLYNN:	Yep (Indistinct)
	STUTZ:	(Indistinct). Yep - okay - definitely
585	FLYNN:	Alright. Now can you also $-$ ah $-$ to the best of your recollection $-$ can you recall which way the current was flowing $-$ that day
	STUTZ:	I – I believe it was going down the ship
590	FLYNN:	Going parallel with the ship
	STUTZ:	Yeah – I think it was – yeah

595	FLYNN:	Okay. If you could just put some kind of notation in there saying that you show the current flowing along the path – along parallel with the ship
	STUTZ:	I believe it was going like this
600	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	And the reason – one of the reasons why is that there was a period of time where – um – when we were going down the descent line
605	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
610	STUTZ:	Where I mean $-1$ – it was like a split second where I – I – lost contact with the line and I was like – the current was enough that – it pulled me away from the line
610	FLYNN:	Okay
615	STUTZ:	And I remember – you know the line being at this kinda angle and I was being pulled – away this way
013	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	Do you know what I mean
620	FLYNN:	Yes. Yes
	STUTZ:	I can certainly remember that – and swimming back towards the line
625	FLYNN:	Okay. Can you just write
023	STUTZ:	Can I write - right there
	FLYNN:	Sure. Alright. Now - in giving this - ah - this rough map of the area
630	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
	FLYNN:	Can you recall – or – approximately place yourself where you saw – ah – Diver 1 and Diver 2 as far as you – in relation to your position
635	STUTZ:	Yep. Let's see. It's – now this is five metres we'll say
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm

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640	STUTZ:	Um – see we would be hanging on the line like – like this roughly. Um – they were down and to my left. They would be down - in this area here – roughly – and they were coming across – my field of view
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
645	STUTZ:	Like that. So they were coming across like this – and at the time I didn't know whether they were descending or ascending – because I just saw a group of people – four or five people together
650	FLYNN:	Uh-huh
650	STUTZ:	And – basically below me to my left coming across – and um – yeah – that's about right – and – um – yeah – I saw a smattering of people – and then I saw that one diver in distress – down like that
655	FLYNN:	Yeah
	STUTZ:	So about right there. I don't know if that's a good enough - drawing
660	FLYNN:	Yeah – yeah – that's fine. So – I'se – I'm just trying to clarify – um – with roughly where you were. Now obviously there's going to be some – you know – some flexibility – give and take as far as exactly
	STUTZ:	Yeah
665	FLYNN:	Where they were
	STUTZ:	Yeah
670	FLYNN:	Just an approximate guess
070	STUTZ:	(Indistinct)
	FLYNN:	Yeah – okay – alright
675	STUTZ:	You know - pretty - I was in the water for an hour
	FLYNN:	Yeah. Yeah
680	STUTZ:	It's kinda hard to tell
685	FLYNN:	Alright – um – so you commented on the direction – ah - that it was – ah – flowing along with the wreck – um – alright – specifically with Question 2 from the email and Paragraph 12 from the Statement – there was reference to a group of divers which included Diver 1 and Diver 2

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	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
	FLYNN:	This is prior to the separation- of Diver 1 and Diver 2
690	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm
	FLYNN:	From which position did you observe this couple
605	STUTZ:	Um - they were both - I was above them - they were down to my left
695	FLYNN:	Okay - so above them and down to your left. Alright
	STUTZ:	When I was holding on the line looking at them they were
700	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	Down - here
705	FLYNN:	Can you comment – alright – so comment more on the angle of the observation – which you just did – and the possible distance bearing in mind it's a three dimensional thing
710	STUTZ:	Mm-hmm, Mm-hmm. Yep. That was about twenty feet – twenty (indistinct) three dimensional (indistinct)
710	FLYNN:	Airight - ah
216	STUTZ:	Where was – the water was very clear but – I mean we were close enough – I could see her face
715	FLYNN:	Yeah
	STUTZ:	You know I mean
720	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	I could see the expression on her face
725	FLYNN:	Okay
	STUTZ:	So
730	FLYNN:	Alright – um - just below – can you comment on whether it was off to his left or right – which you did – you commented that it was off to your left - and – ah - were you facing the wreck or away from the wreck – if it was his left or right

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735	STUTZ:	I'm not quite as clear but – what I remember – I don't remember when I was looking at them – seeing the wreck - in my visual field – with them beneath it
	FLYNN:	Mm-hmm
740	STUTZ:	I remember the wreck being - above and to the right now
740	FLYNN:	Okay. Alright. Ah – let's see. With reference to the divers
745	STUTZ:	When you're looking - very simply - if I was to look at this as the surface
745	FLYNN:	Yes
